Tuesday 06 Feb

All the tour participants met up at the airport in Johannesburg at 10h30 and we soon set off for the Golden Gate Highlands National Park in the Free State Province. Travelling south along the main N3 motorway a lunch stop was made near the town of Villiers. Some birds seen in the gardens surrounding the parking lot included **Southern Masked Weaver, Speckled Pigeon, White-browed Sparrow-Weaver, Southern Red Bishop** and **Cape Wagtail**. Approximately 60km further down the N3 we turned off onto a secondary road where the travelling speed was reduced, allowing for good roadside birding in the adjacent farmlands. At a farm dam near the town of Warden, we spotted **Red-knobbed Coot, Spur-winged Goose, Greater Flamingo, Black-headed Heron, Cape Longclaw** and beautiful **Yellow-crowned Bishops** performing their 'bumblebee' display flights. Near the town of Clarens we had **White** and **Abdim's Stork, Common Buzzard** (the first of many) and **Lanner Falcon**. After travelling through the attractive grasslands and sandstone hills of the Clarens region we entered the Golden Gate National Park. Here we were greeted by the first large mammals of the tour, a herd of **Red Hartebeest**. Once settled into our accommodation in the Golden Gate Hotel there was time for a quick walk around the grounds which produced some fine birds in the form of **Ground Woodpecker, African Pied Starling, Red-throated Wryneck, Cape Weaver, Crested Barbet, White-throated** and **Greater-striped Swallow, Red-winged Starling, Cape White-eye** and **Cape Robin-Chat**.

Wednesday 07 Feb

After enjoying an early breakfast we took a drive along some of the loop roads in the park seeing some attractive mammals with Blesbok, Plains Zebra, Springbok, Black-backed Jackal, Grey Rhebok, Red Hartebeest and Black Wildebeest the most notable. Despite some typically inclement 'highlands weather' some good birds were seen on this excursion, including Red-collared Widowbird, African Black Swift, Levaillant's and Wingsnapping Cisticola, Southern Fiscal, Jackal Buzzard and Buff-streaked Chat. At a spot appropriately named Protea Corner, we took a walk to the edge of a wooded ravine overlooking some rocky habitat and a large grove of Protea caffra and P. roupelliae, flushing a Common Buttonguail in the process. Good views of male Malachite Sunbirds, Cape Rock Thrush and Wailing Cisticola were enjoyed before the target bird eventually showed up, the localised Gurney's Sugarbird. In the grounds of an open-air Basotho museum we had good looks at Fiscal Flycatcher, African Red-eyed Bulbul, Southern Boubou and Speckled Mousebird. On the way back to the hotel we spotted a stunning Black Harrier foraging over the grassy slopes and a Bearded Vulture soaring overhead while Little Bittern, Reed Cormorant and Yellow-billed duck were seen at a small dam. While enjoying a light lunch and the attractive vistas from the hotel's upper restaurant we were also briefly entertained by a pair of Verreaux's Eagle flying along the large sandstone buttresses. During our afternoon excursion we popped into the vulture 'restaurant' hide where there were Black-backed Jackal, Cape Crow and White-necked Raven scavenging at a carcass that was put out earlier in the day. Other species seen at this site were Yellow Bishop, Ant-eating Chat, Mountain Wheatear and a covey of Red-winged Francolin briefly seen by a few as they rapidly flew over a rise. By this time the wind had picked up considerably so it was decided to find a sheltered, wooded area to look for a few more localised passerines. The decision was justified when we had great views of firstly Drakensberg Prinia and then a fine Bush Blackcap. Satisfied, we returned to the hotel to wind down with a relaxed dinner and fine wine.

Thursday 08 Feb

Today's full program required an early breakfast before setting off for the Wakkerstroom region with a whole lot of other activities scheduled en-route. Firstly we headed up into the higher altitudes of the Drakensberg Mountain Range which saw us travelling eastward through the green grasslands and hills of the Golden Gate Park and then via the densely populated area of Qwaqwa. On the way up to the Witsieshoek Conservancy we had literally hundreds of **Amur Falcons** on the wires and the odd **Black-winged Kite.** At the end of a rather jarring road we got to the base of the Sentinel Peak (unfortunately shrouded by dense cloud) where we set out on a walk to locate one of the true Drakensberg specials. At an altitude of close to 3000masl we took things easy but it didn't take long before we were enjoying close-up views of a pair of **Drakensberg Rockjumpers**. Other species seen in the misty conditions were **Rock Hyrax**, **Drakensberg Crag Lizards**, **Rock Kestrel**, **Cape Canary** and **Familiar Chat**. Then it was back down to slightly lower altitudes as we continued the drive to Wakkerstroom via Harrismith. At the hamlet of Verkykerskop we took a slight detour to enjoy lunch at the impressive Witkoppen Reserve and lodge. The owner accompanied us on a short drive during which we saw large numbers of mammals and some nice birds including **Eastern Long-billed Lark**, **Bokmakierie**, **South African Cliff Swallow**, **Banded Martin**, **Common Waxbill**, **Pin-tailed Whydah** and many **Common**, **Alpine** and **White-rumped Swift**. Good looks at **Denham's Bustard**, **Secretarybird** and **Southern Bald Ibis** were also enjoyed in the Verkykerskop area. A very large storm that had made its way through the area made travelling on the unpaved roads rather challenging, before we had the luxury of good tarred surfaces for the remainder of the day's journey. Wakkerstroom and the charming Wetlands B&B were reached by early evening.

Friday 9 Feb

We were met by local Wakkerstroom bird guide Lucky Ngwenya for an early excursion along the farm roads south of Wakkerstroom. Some of the significant birds seen along this loop were Red-capped Lark, Yellowbreasted Pipit, Grey-crowned and Blue Cranes, Red-billed Quelea, Cape Sparrow, Diderick Cuckoo and many displaying Long-tailed Widowbirds. At a small wetland along the route there were White-backed Duck and Whiskered Tern. After a delicious breakfast at the B&B, during which we watched Village Weaver, Redeyed, Laughing and Ring-necked Dove (seen on every day of the tour) at the bird feeders, Lucky directed us to some of his choice birding spots to the north of Wakkerstroom. Along the road to the town of Amersfoort we had African Pipit (dozens) along with Fan-tailed Widowbird, Denham's Bustard, Black-winged and Crowned Lapwing, Spike-heeled Lark and Zitting Cisticola to name but a few. At the large rural settlement of Daggakraal Lucky found a pair of the highly localised Botha's Lark and further on at the Fickland Pan the critically endangered Rudd's Lark. Our picnic lunch at the pan was rudely interrupted by a passing shower but when it did clear we scanned the water body, picking out Maccoa Duck, Southern Pochard, Red-billed Teal, Cape Shoveler, Great Crested Grebe and African Spoonbill, while a stunning male Pallid Harrier also made an appearance. Other significant species seen at this site and along the route back to Wakkerstroom were Common Quail, Pale-crowned Cisticola, Eastern Clapper Lark and Namagua Dove. Back in Wakkerstroom, an hour or so spent on the bridge over the local wetland produced sightings of African Swamphen, South African Shelduck, Hottentot Teal, Black-crowned Night-Heron, Malachite Kingfisher, Lesser Swamp-Warbler, Little Rush Warbler and African Marsh Harrier. Mammal highlights of the day were Yellow Mongoose, Meerkat and a family of the seldom seen Spot-necked Otter. The day ended with a meal at the 'Metamorphasis' Bistro in the village.

Saturday 10 Feb

The day started off with a drive to the Slang (Snake) River and the Zaaihoek Dam situated south-west of Wakkerstroom. This outing produced Mocking Cliff-Chat, Brown-throated Martin, African Wattled Lapwing, Drakensberg Prinia, Giant Kingfisher, Cape Bunting, Cape Grassbird, Horus Swift, African Black Duck and a single Red-footed Falcon amidst hundreds of Amurs. Back at the Wetlands B&B there were several birds seen in the garden during and after breakfast. These included African Hoopoe, Red-throated Wryneck, Olive Thrush, Black-throated Canary, Crested Barbet, Streaky-headed Seedeater and Amethyst Sunbird. Then it was back on the road as we started the lengthy journey to Kruger, travelling via the towns of Ermelo, Carolina, Machadodorp and Bombela. During a stop near Machadodorp to have our packed lunch, Thick-billed Weaver, Lesser-striped Swallow and Bronze Mannikin were added to the trip list. Kruger's Malelane Gate was reached by late afternoon and the long journey was soon forgotten as the group patrolled the high-water bridge over the Crocodile River (Kruger's southern boundary) and started seeing some exciting mammals, reptiles and birds. There were Hippo, Bushbuck and Waterbuck while some rather large Nile Crocodiles were menacingly lying about in the shallows. The Crocodile River bird parade included Water Thick-knee, Whitefaced Whistling Duck, Grey and Goliath Heron, Little Swift, Wood Sandpiper, Great Cormorant, Wiretailed Swallow, Black Crake, Black-winged Stilt, African Pied Wagtail, Three-banded Plover and Pied **Kingfisher**. Once through the gate, we had a short (12km) drive to our camp for the night at Berg-en-Dal. On this stretch we had good close-up views of Impala (by far the most numerous of Kruger's larger mammals) and

Cape Buffalo while a few of Kruger's widespread but iconic birds such as Magpie Shrike, Lilac-breasted Roller, Southern Red-billed and Yellow-billed Hornbill, Blue Waxbill, Grey Go-away-bird and Swainson's Spurfowl were also seen. Not to be outdone by these residents some of the common Palaearctic migrants such as Spotted Flycatcher, Red-backed Shrike and European Roller also showed themselves. Berg-en-Dal Camp was reached just before the official gate closing time of 18h30.

Sunday 11 Feb

A dawn departure from Berg-en-Dal to the Skukuza Camp via the main tarred road produced many great mammal sightings of species such as African Elephant, White Rhino, a large clan of Spotted Hyena, Warthog, Giraffe, Zebra, Blue Wildebeest, Greater Kudu, Vervet Monkey, Grey Duiker and Dwarf and Slender Mongoose. Noteworthy bird species seen en-route to Skukuza were African Grey Hornbill, Yellowthroated Longclaw, Red-billed Oxpecker, Cape, Greater Blue-eared, Wattled and Burchell's Starling, Wahlberg's and Martial Eagle, Arrow-marked Babbler, Red-billed Buffalo Weaver, Natal Spurfowl, Redcrested Korhaan and Crested Francolin. Skukuza was reached in time for a hearty brunch after which a short walk in the gardens produced African Paradise-Flycatcher, Yellow-billed Kite, African Green Pigeon, Violetbacked Starling, Village Indigobird and its host Red-billed Firefinch. An hour or so spent at the 'Lake Panic' bird hide outside Skukuza gave the photographers in the group some great photo opportunities with the likes of Squacco and Striated Heron, Malachite Kingfisher, Black Crake, Tawny-flanked Prinia and African Jacana all showing well within a few meters of the hide. Then it was back to Skukuza to check in and enjoy a muchneeded siesta. The day was rounded off with a leisurely drive along a few loops south of Skukuza during which some 'lazy' lion and not so lazy Jacobin and Levaillant's Cuckoo, Red-faced Mousebird, White-crested Helmet-Shrike, Green-winged Pytilia and Pearl-spotted Owlet were seen.

Monday 12 Feb

Another early start as we headed out to do a pre-breakfast drive to the west of Skukuza. Some prominent birds seen on this drive were Southern Ground Hornbill, White-backed Vulture, Bateleur, Brown Snake Eagle, Little Bee-eater, Woodland Kingfisher, Lesser Masked-Weaver, Black-crowned Tchagra and Whitebrowed Scrub Robin. From the top of a large granite outcrop we picked up Black-backed Puffback, Whitebellied Sunbird, Jameson's Firefinch, Rattling Cisticola, Chinspot Batis, Long-billed Crombec and Southern Black Tit. Then it was back to Skukuza for breakfast before heading back out for the drive to our next camp, Satara. The route taken was along the very productive Sabie River to the Lower Sabie Camp for a break and a snack and then northward over the Nkumbe Hills and onto the basalt plains in which Satara is located. The Sabie River and surrounds produced good sightings in the form of African Openbill, Marabou, Woollynecked and Yellow-billed Stork, Southern Carmine Bee-eater, White-crowned Lapwing, African Fish Eagle, Kittlitz's Plover, Knob-billed Duck, Great Egret and Hamerkop. As for the mammals, there were many Elephant herds, good numbers of African Buffalo, Giraffe and Impala. We had a glimpse of two African Wild Dog before they disappeared into the shady undergrowth but had more time with a troop of Chacma Baboons who were enjoying a feast of Marula fruit while the young ones playfully harassed a group of Banded Mongoose. The drive north from Lower Sabie was a hot one and the bush was severely parched due to the poor rainfall of the past few months and relentless high temperatures. Despite the hot and dry conditions we still managed to see good numbers of Elephant, Zebra, Kudu, Steenbok and Wildebeest and had a good sighting of a Lioness in a dry riverbed. Interesting birds seen on the way to Satara were Secretarybird, Senegal Lapwing, White-winged Widowbird, Purple Roller and African Hawk-Eagle (juvenile). Satara was reached by late afternoon and after a short rest and an early dinner we boarded an open safari vehicle for a night drive. Unfortunately, very windy conditions kept the nocturnal birds hidden apart from a Marsh Owl who did bother to make an appearance. Exciting mammals seen on this nocturnal excursion included Spotted Hyena, African Porcupine, Scrub Hare, Black-backed Jackal and a beautiful Serval.

Tuesday 13 Feb

The morning was spent taking an easy drive north to the Olifants River where we had breakfast at the lofty Olifants Camp with its delightful views of the river below and the seemingly endless bushveld beyond. Some good birds were seen during this excursion including **Cape, Lappet-faced** and **White-headed Vulture, Common Ostrich, Brown-hooded Kingfisher, Sabota** and **Dusky Lark, Black-headed Oriole, Kori Bustard,**

Lesser Grey Shrike, Saddle-billed Stork and a Tawny Eagle feeding on a Natal Spurfowl while being pestered by a group of Southern Ground Hornbill. A welcome siesta was enjoyed by the group before doing a late afternoon drive. Highlights of this outing to the Lebombo Mountains along the eastern reaches of the park was a pride of Lion resting in the shade of a Lala Palm grove and a very affectionate pair of Cheetah going through their pre-mating rituals in preparation for 'Valentine's Day'. Back at camp, some of the group watched large numbers of Double-banded Sandgrouse coming in for an evening drink at the camp waterhole.

Wednesday 14 Feb

Another early excursion, this time to the broad-leaved woodland habitats to the south-west of Satara produced sightings of Bennett's and Golden-tailed Woodpecker, Brown-crowned Tchagra, Great-spotted Cuckoo, Green Woodhoopoe, Burnt-necked Eremomela and Green Sandpiper seen at a muddy waterhole called Nsemane. A stop at the Muzandzeni Picnic Site for a snack and a stretch gave us a lovely birding treat in the form of a roosting African Scops Owl barely two meters away. After breakfast at Satara we packed up and had a short walk through the camp adding Yellow-fronted Canary, Marico Sunbird, Yellow-breasted Apalis, Emerald-spotted Wood Dove, Willow Warbler, Orange-breasted Bush-Shrike, Brown-headed Parrot and Brubru to the bird list. The park was exited via the Orpen gate, but not before we had superb views of a pack of 17 African Wild Dog right next to the road. The dogs were extremely relaxed, lying up in the shade of some low Acacia bushes with two Hooded Vultures in close attendance. After leaving the park we briefly headed up into the Limpopo Province, stopping off at the Moholoholo Ya Mati tea garden on the banks of the Blyde River for lunch. A walk around the beautiful gardens at this spot produced good looks at both Yellow-fronted and Yellowrumped Tinkerbirds along with Ashy Flycatcher, Scarlet-chested Sunbird and Black-collared Barbet. On the way up the eastern Escarpment we stopped off along the spectacular Abel Erasmus Pass were local guide Michael Kumako pointed out the resident **Taita Falcon**. What a pleasure it was to get superb views of one of the World's rarest raptors against the dramatic backdrop of the northern Drakensberg landscape. The last leg of the day's journey took us through more mountain scenery before reaching the Mount Sheba Hotel situated amongst Afro-montane forest and grassland habitats.

Thursday 15 Feb

An early morning walk into a forest patch adjacent to the hotel gave us **Cape Batis**, **Olive Woodpecker**, **Terrestrial Brownbul**, **Grey Cuckooshrike**, **Yellow-throated Woodland Warbler**, **Greater Double-collared Sunbird**, **Yellow-streaked Greenbul** and a delightful **Knysna Turaco**. Back at the hotel we were entertained by a troop of **Blue Monkeys** before sitting down for yet another hearty breakfast. This was followed by a scenic road trip along the aptly-named Panorama Route. We made brief visits to the touristy towns of Pilgrims Rest and Graskop before taking in the dramatic views of the Blyde River Canyon. After some clambering through the rocky terrain we were rewarded with great looks at **Cape Bunting** and **Lazy Cisticola** and a few colourful lizards in the form of **Rainbow Rock-Skink**, **Variable Skink**, **Common Flat Lizard** and **Yellow-lined Plated Lizard**. Drinks were taken at the very picturesque Blyde River Canyon Resort before returning to Mount Sheba via the town of Orichstad where **White-fronted Bee-eaters**, **Long-tailed Paradise-Whydah** and **Palm Swifts** were seen. After a great final dinner we headed into the dark forest for a bit of 'owling' and were very lucky to get fantastic views of a pair of **African Wood Owls**.

Friday 16 Feb

A final early morning forest excursion was a quiet affair, although we did see **Dusky Flycatcher, Southern Double-collared Sunbird, White-starred Robin** and **Chorister Robin-Chat.** Once packed up, we headed along the bumpy track that leads out to the main road and started the drive back to Johannesburg via the towns of Dullstroom and Witbank. A few 'new' birds were seen en-route, namely **Groundscraper Thrush, African Darter** and **Long-crested Eagle.** After a lunch stop near the town of Middleburg we took on the final leg of the journey through the eastern outskirts and suburbs of the greater Johannesburg area before reaching the OR Tambo Airport in the late afternoon.
